And, we take our show on the road. Each year we are in close to 3,000 elementary school classrooms, reaching nearly 60,000 kids with hands-on science. That's a remarkable number. For all we do to serve every kid and their families, Discovery Museum has earned incredible recognition.

We were honored in 2024 with the nation's highest honor for museums: a National Medal from the Institute of Museum and Library Services. We are incredibly proud.
